Eva with Autism Service Dog Lizzy

Eva is 6 years old and was
diagnosed with autism 2 years ago.
It was considered a late diagnosis,
so we moved from Winnipeg to
Calgary to help Eva get as much
professional support that we could.

While a very gentle, curious and smiley girl, she still experiences many challenges. With Autism Service Dog Lizzy in our lives, everything is better in so many ways. One of the most important changes is that Lizzy keeps Eva safe. From Eva and Lizzy's first walk together, it was obvious that Eva was so focused on Lizzy that there were no thoughts of bolting; it was all about holding Lizzy's handle and staying together.

Eva is 90% non-verbal and she's been working hard to express herself using words. When Eva first heard us use commands that Lizzy would react to, it encouraged Eva to use them as well.

We also noticed a change in Eva's anxiety. Eva seems calmer and more relaxed with Lizzy. We've observed more laughs and smiles and lots of singing. We believe that there are two main reasons for



this. First, having Lizzy integrated into our routine brings more structure to our day, which gives Eva the feeling of predictability, confidence and certainty. Secondly, Eva and Lizzy have bonded so quickly! Eva, who is afraid of dogs, plays with Lizzy by throwing her a toy, tries to hug and kiss her, and lets Lizzy sleep in her room. It's incredible! And it's priceless.



Hearing about BC & Alberta Guide Dogs has been life changing for our family. When we received the call telling us that Lizzy was on her way, that was a great day... one of the best.

The Gift of Cory

Caleb is a triplet; one of three identical 7-year-old boys who only weighed a pound and a half each when they were born.

His brothers, Kaeden and Kaius came home from the NICU after 6



months, but Caleb came home after a year. His eventful journey into the world has meant that he has a global developmental delay and hearing loss. He is non-verbal and had been tube-fed up until a year and a half ago. All three boys have been diagnosed with autism.

Autism Service Dog Cory joined our "pack" in mid-April and has proven to be everything we had hoped for. We wanted Cory to help keep Caleb safe, so he would not bolt or suddenly attempt to cross the street. The first time Caleb was tethered to Cory, he didn't even attempt to leave her side. This significant change in behaviour now allows us to go for a walk or to the mall as a family without constant fear for Caleb's safety.

She has given him a taste of the freedom that we know he desires.

Not only has Cory given us more independence when we are in the community, but she has given Caleb a taste of the freedom that we know he desires. When he is tethered to her, he skips alongside her, but stays close and follows Cory's lead when it's time to stop or carry on.

One challenge that many parents of kids with autism face is reduced opportunities for social interaction. Since Cory, Caleb has started to

interact with his brothers, taking their hand and engaging them in play. Cory will be joining Caleb at his school in November and we anticipate Cory acting as an icebreaker with Caleb and his peers so that Caleb is less isolated.



Cory has also been a benefit to Kaeden and Kaius in ways that we hadn't expected. Morning transitions are a challenge for them and can result in prolonged tantrums as they are slowly trying to adjust from sleeping to waking. Cory lays across their legs on the couch when they wake up, applying deep pressure, which has a calming effect on the boys.

We have to commend the BC & Alberta Guide Dogs organization on their commitment to quality instruction, and for maintaining the


high standards necessary to raise a Service Dog from puppy-hood to graduation. This has provided families like mine with the independence, safety, security and comfort that comes with having a professionally-trained Service Dog.

I served in the military for 35+ years, and due to serving in several overseas postings, I have had undiagnosed PTSD for 20 years. My official diagnosis was 3 years ago.

After my personal dog passed away, I went downhill quite a bit. My wife researched online and found out about the 52-week Healthy Community Living Program, and my doctors and Vancouver Island Compassion Dogs helped coordinate a PTSD Service Dog for me.

We are initially introduced to many dogs, and then with help from the VICD team, decide which one works best. The first thing that struck me about Andy was his eyes. After having sheepdogs, and not being

able to see their eyes, it was quite comforting to have a set of eyes focused on you!

Andy, along with the training that I've received, supports me during my triggers and my daily routine activities, as well as with my anxiety. You cannot replace this support with money or other types of worldly goods. Andy has been incredible. He has also opened many non-dog users' eyes of what a Service Dog can do.
